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- East Breakout Group ideas
 - Andre Reed Park needs improvements to define it as a park. These improvements should provide multi-generational opportunities that would keep the park busy throughout the day.
 - Canal Park needs improvements to water access and other areas to make it feel more like a park than an open space.
 - The D&L Trail would benefit from safety upgrades, increased policing, improved lighting and signage.



West Breakout Group ideas

- Participants emphasized the need to extoll the virtues of Allentown's parks and were happy to see some repairs at Union Terrace Park.
- In general, heavy traffic makes accessing parks on foot and by bicycle feel unsafe.
- New trails to connect greenways and other points of interest are needed.





South Breakout Group ideas


- Lighting at Percy Ruhe Park is an issue. Visitors reported using car lights for football practice.
- Participants reported that trash dumping and ATVs cause major issues at South Mountain Reservoir.
- Arrangements with Allentown School District should be formalized to establish standard expectations for everyone.



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Center Breakout Group ideas

- Community ownership of parks is important to establish. This includes communication with the community.
- Participants identified parking and access to water vs water quality and damage to the ecosystem as major issues at parks.
- Connectivity from greenways to downtown is very difficult.



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Recreation Breakout Group ideas

- Participants would like more free / low-cost family programming in parks, including a farmers' market for 2nd Street, which should accept WIC checks.
- Safety and security are concerns throughout the park system.
- Participants recommended holding a listening session in the morning so seniors would attend.



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Online Breakout Group ideas

- Roads do not feel safe for accessing parks as a pedestrian or bicyclist.
- Participants would like to see more places to sit and feed the ducks in parks.
- Participants reported valuing the mental health benefits of parks through activities such as yoga, meditation, and walking.



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Public Opinion Survey Results

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• 263 responses to date

- 254 English language survey
- 9 Spanish language survey
- **35%** reside in Zip Code 18104

 - Parks include: Roosevelt Park, Alton Park Playlot, Lehigh Parkway, Mack Pool, Percy Ruhe Park, South Mountain Reservoir
- **20%** in 18102
 - Parks include: Bucky Boyle Park, Fountain Park, Franklin Park, Jackson St. Community Park, Jordan Meadows, Old Fairgrounds Playground/5th St. Spray Park, Stevens Park, West Park
- 50% of respondents have lived in their communities for 20+ years




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

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
Q6: How do you typically travel to park/recreation sites in the City of Allentown? Answered: 194 Skipped: 70



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Q11: Do you believe the City of Allentown needs more active recreational facilities? Select all that apply.


Answered: 164 Skipped: 99





MLK Trail Phase I

- City awarded \$250,000 from DCED MTF program toward Phase 1 construction
- Extension project will ultimately connect Lehigh Parkway to Fountain Park
- Proposed as a 10-foot-wide multiuse path
- Additional improvements include rapid flashing beacons, crosswalks, pavement markings, street lighting and stormwater management



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Safe Streets for All (SS4A)

- SS4A is a US Department of Transportation program that provides grants to communities for planning and implementation activities to prevent deaths and serious injuries on roadways.
- City received \$312,000 from USDOT to prepare an SS4A Action Plan; currently in process
- City adopted Vision Zero policy in 2024 with a goal to eliminate traffic fatalities and severe traffic-related injuries by 2030
- City was recently awarded a \$384,000 SS4A Demonstration Grant to implement and observe temporary measures such as pavement markings, crosswalks, speed humps and traffic measure testing


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Active Transportation Plan (ATP)

- An Active Transportation Plan is a comprehensive resource that documents existing conditions and guides the planning, design, implementation, and evaluation of bicycle and pedestrian programs, policies, guidelines, and infrastructure improvements.
- City received \$35,000 through WalkWorks to create an ATP
- Input from residents and community members will be important to help achieve the overall goal of increasing connectivity





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



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Official Map

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What is an Official Map?

- As permitted by the PA Municipal Planning Code, the Official Map is a combined map and ordinance designed to implement the goals and community vision set forth in the Comprehensive Plan.
- The Official Map shows the locations of planned future public lands and facilities such as transportation, recreational parks and trails, and open space.
- The Official Map expresses a municipality's interest in acquiring these lands for public purposes at some future time.



Pennsylvania Municipalities Planning Code

Act of 1968, P.L.805, No.247 as reenacted and amended




Official Map - Benefits

- Helps to focus limited financial resources on projects that meet and advance community goals.
- Helps to make improvements such as the street network improvements, intersection improvements, protecting natural areas, providing more green space, recreation facilities, trails, and sidewalks.
- Saves time and money by informing property owners and developers of municipal goals and intentions in advance of land development plans.
- Effective negotiation tool for municipalities, helping to ensure development is compatible with and supportive of public goals.
- Gives municipalities advantage in securing grants.
