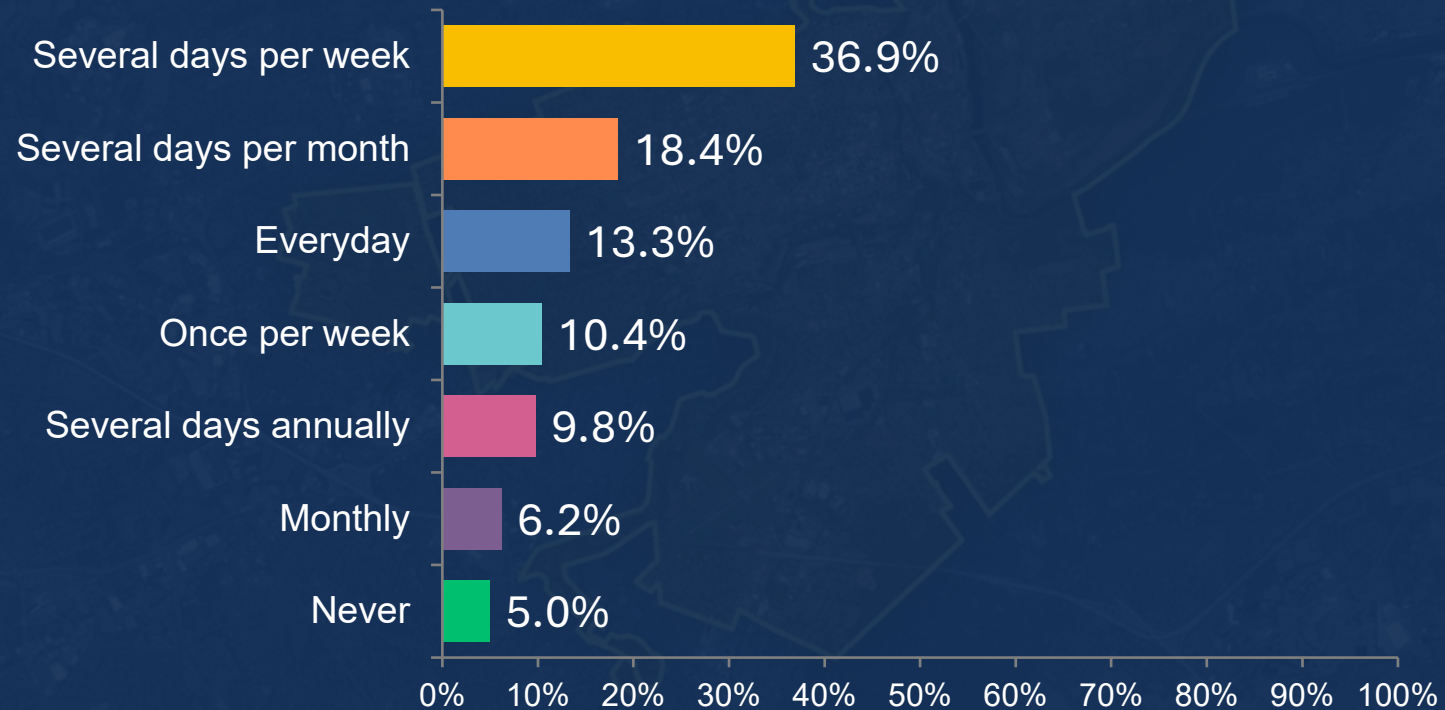

Q1: Generally, how often do people in your household visit parks in the City of Allentown?

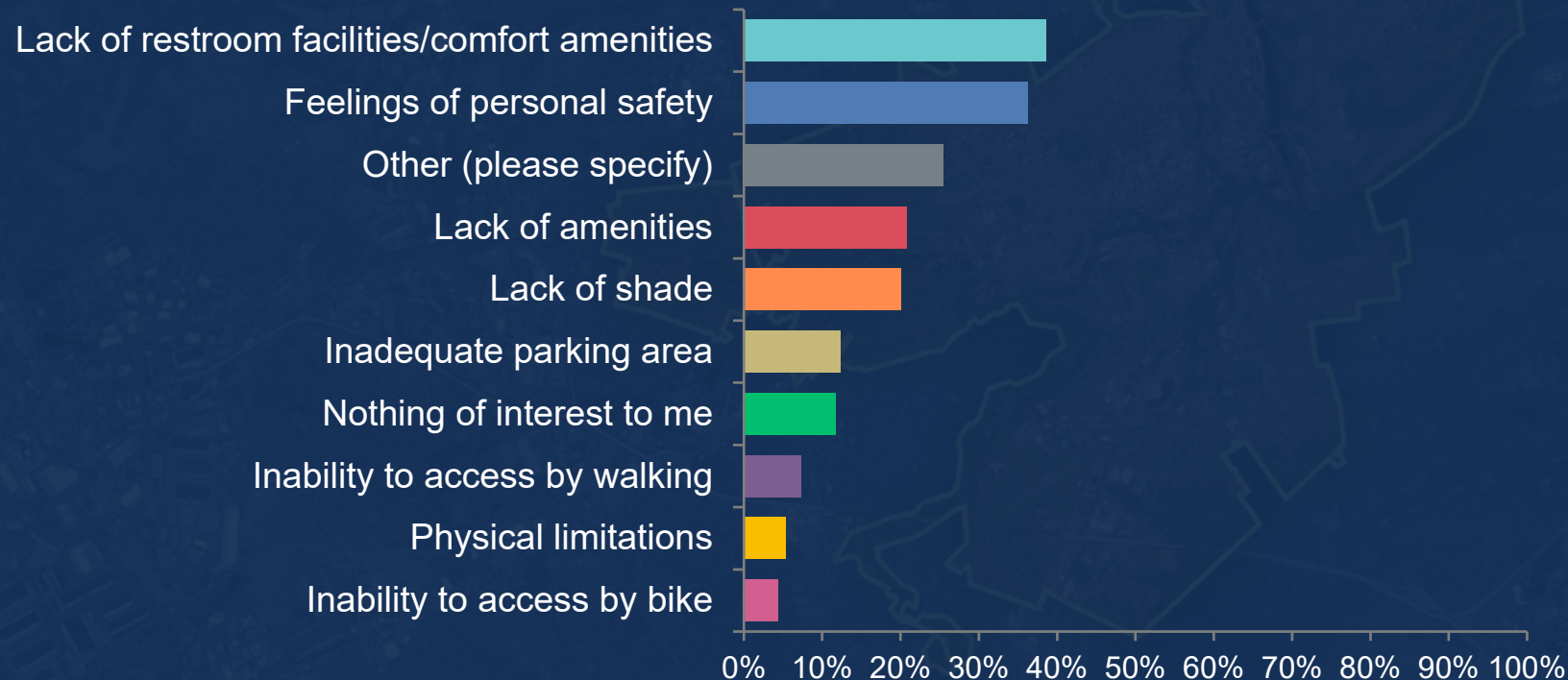

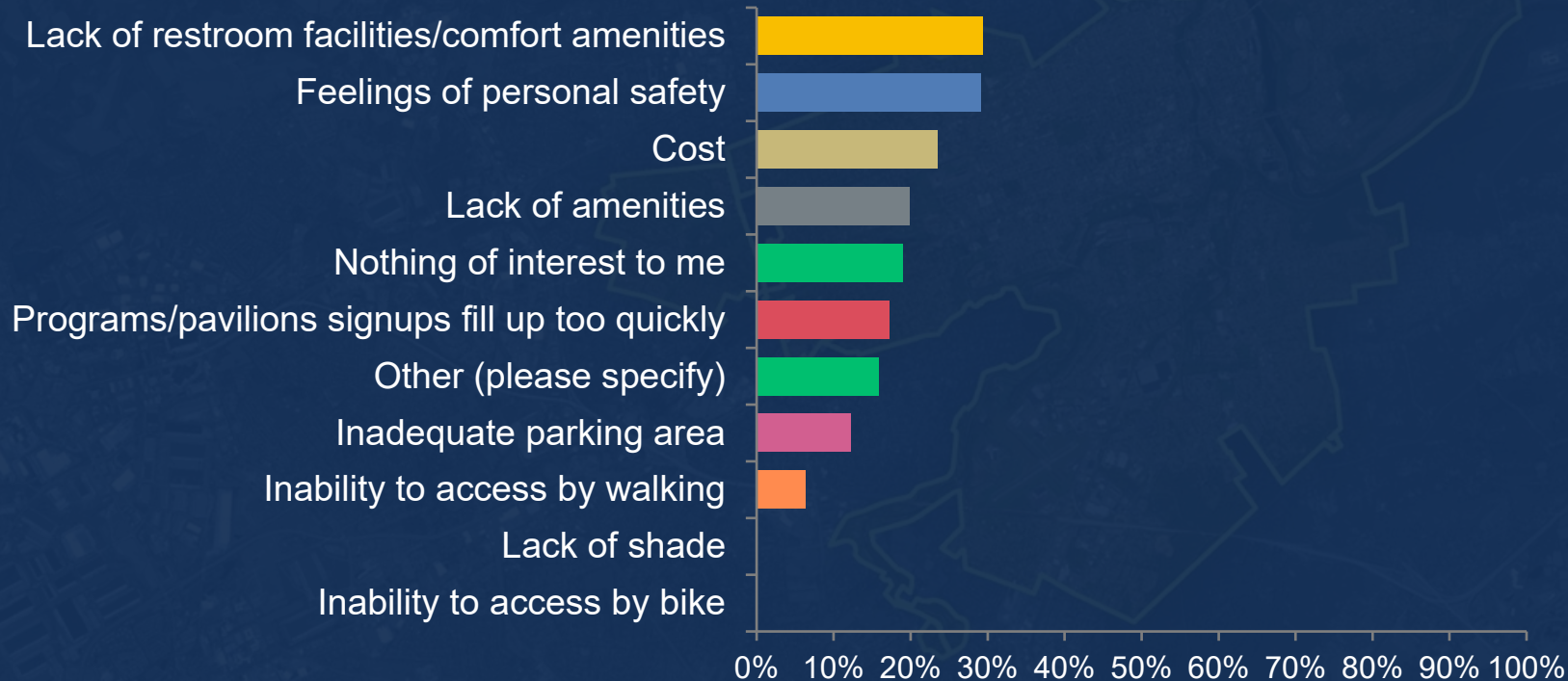

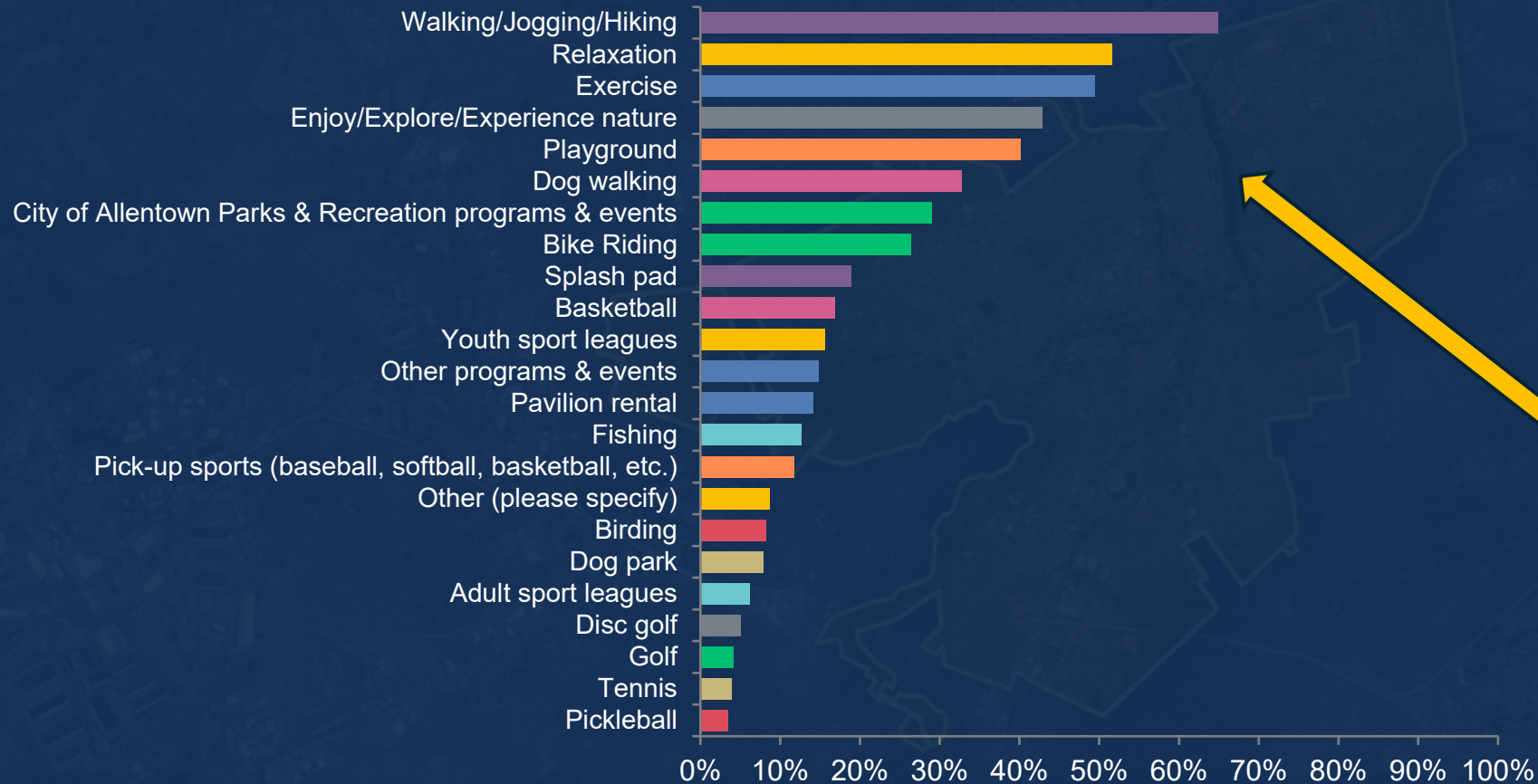

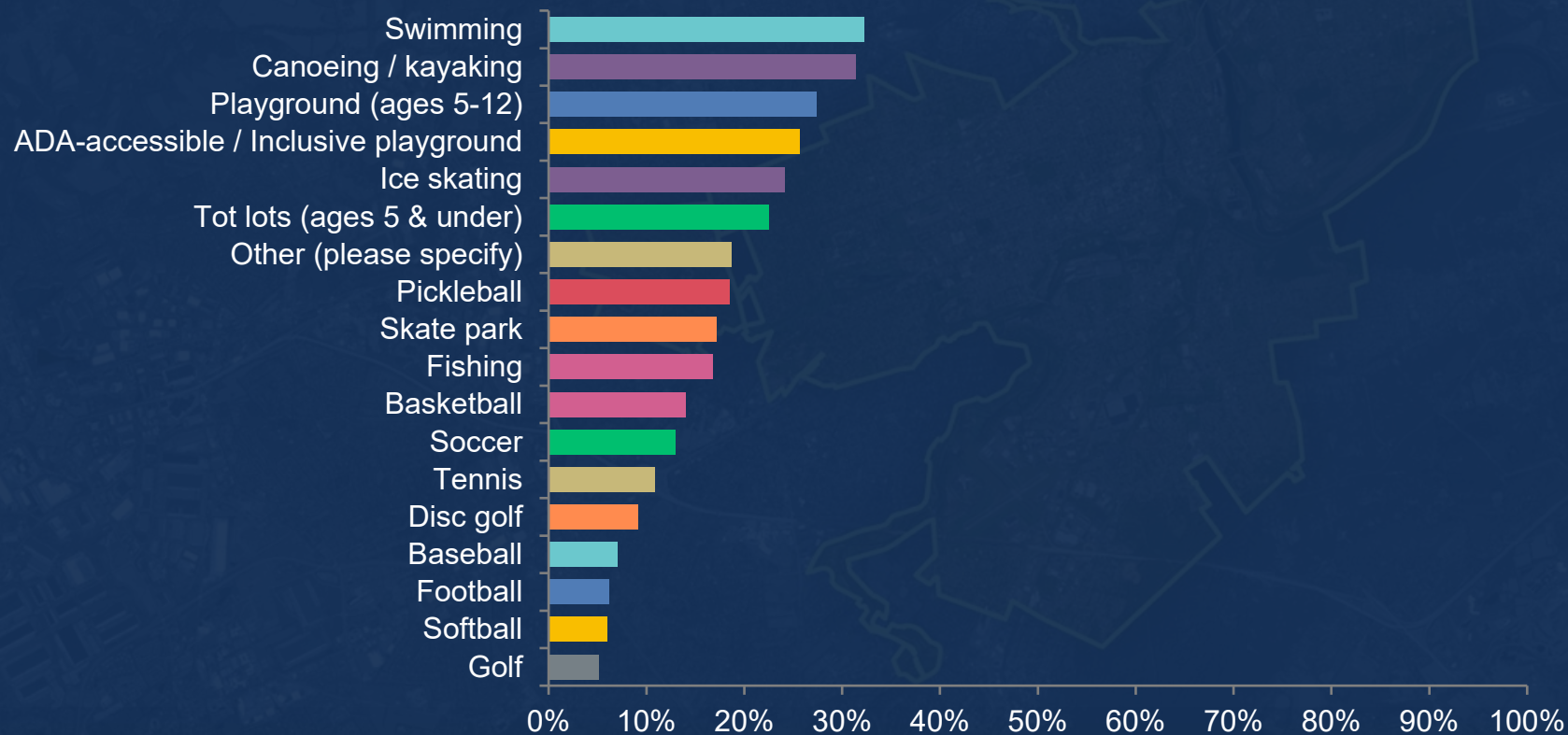

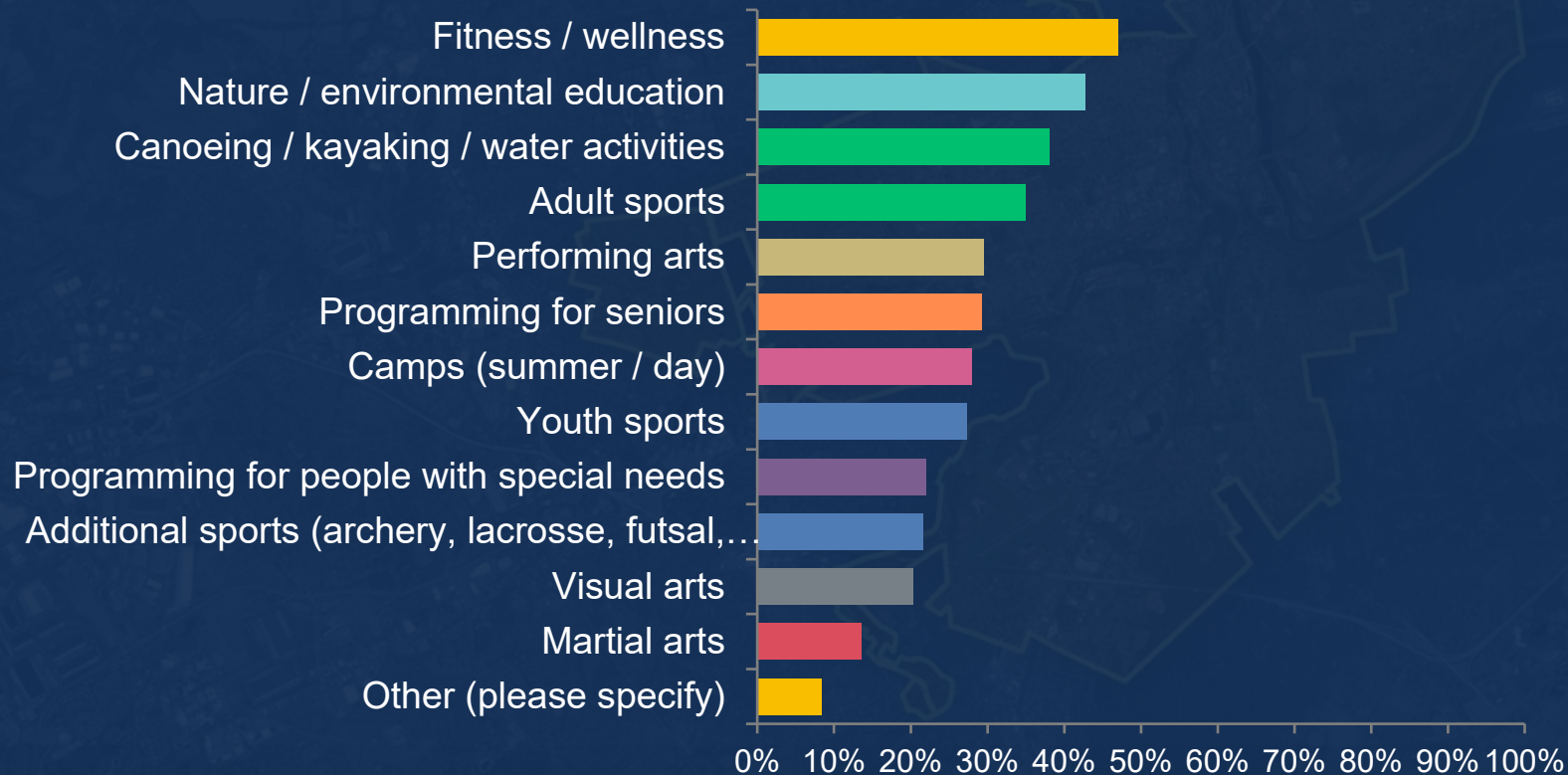

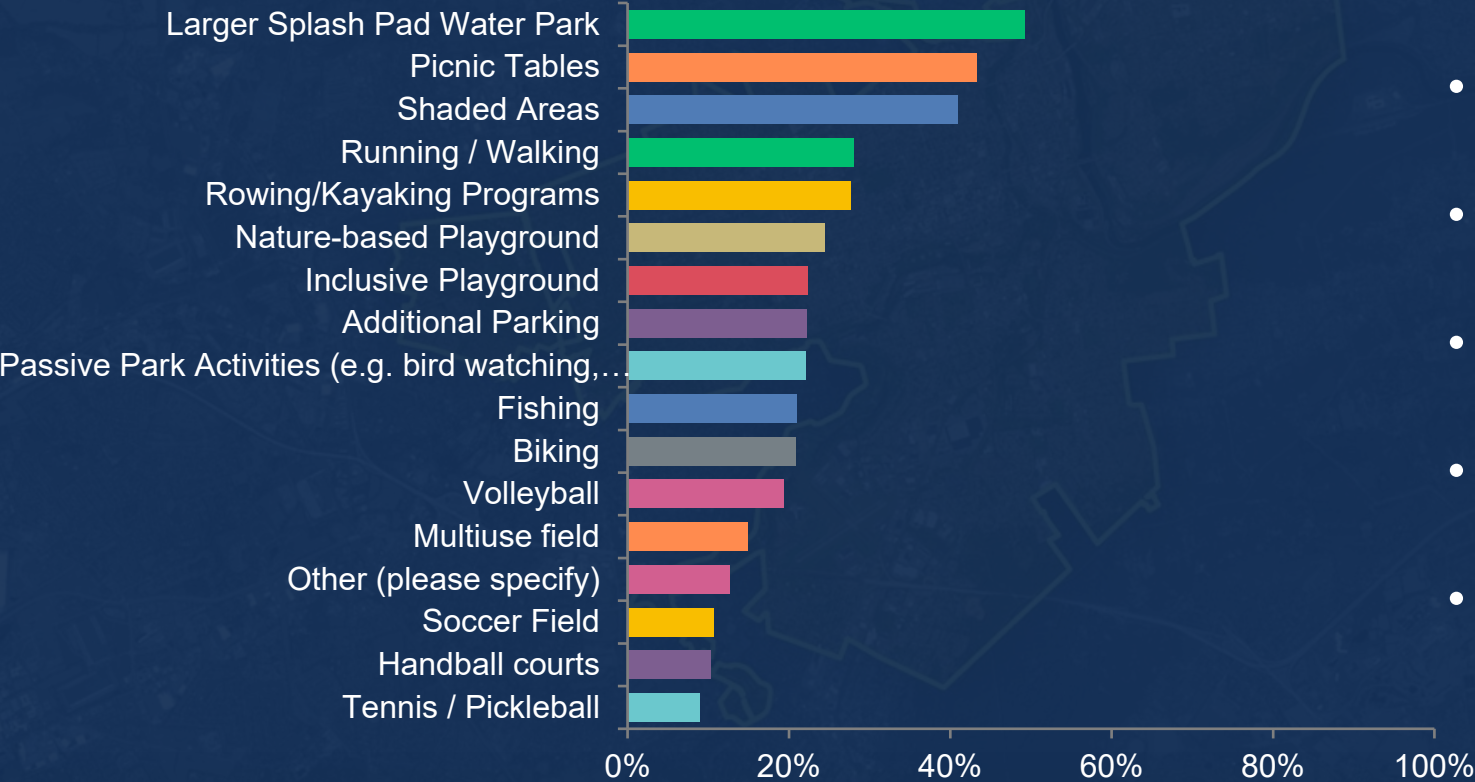

Answered: 589 Skipped: 1300



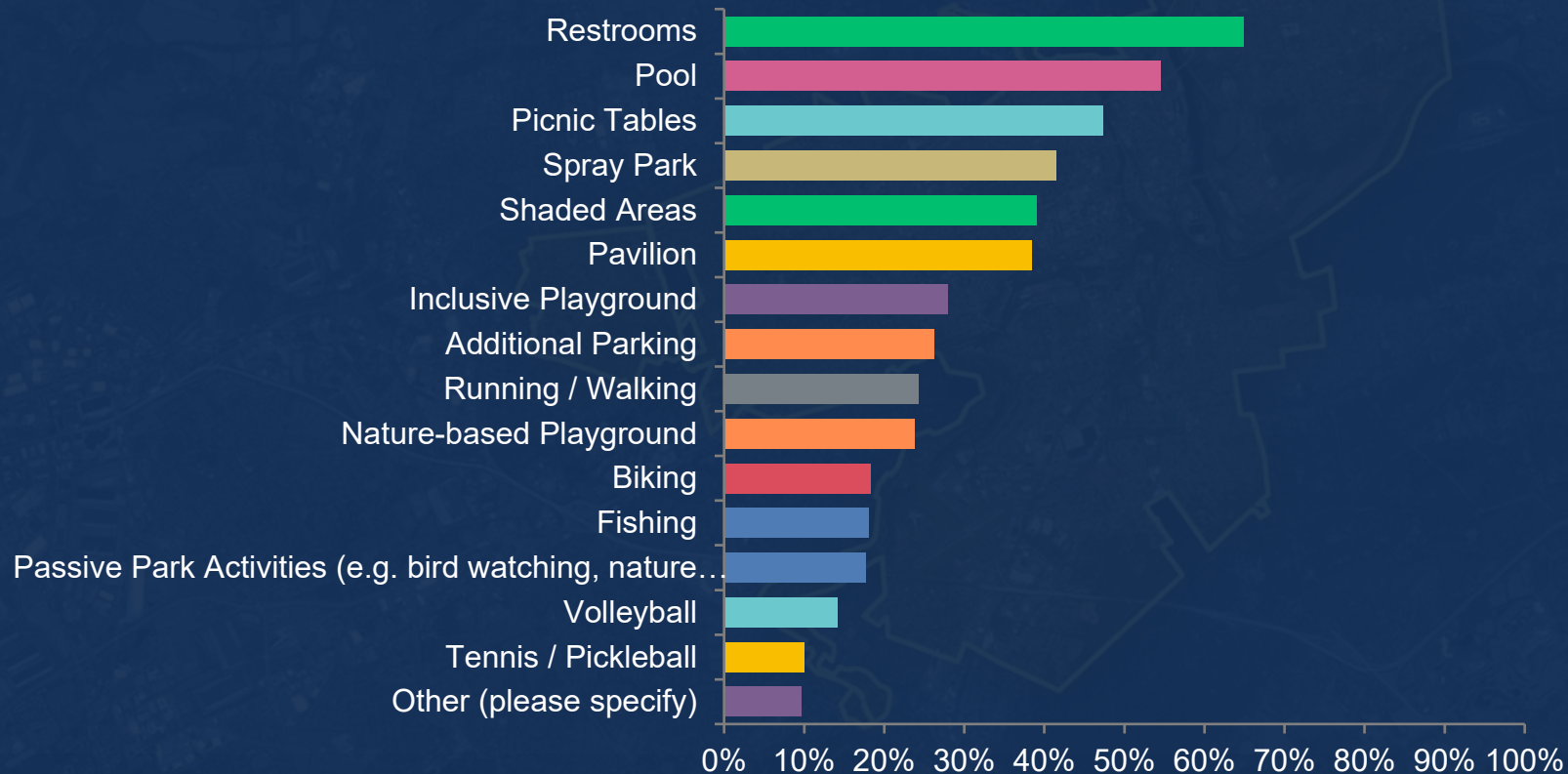

Answered: 530 Skipped: 1359



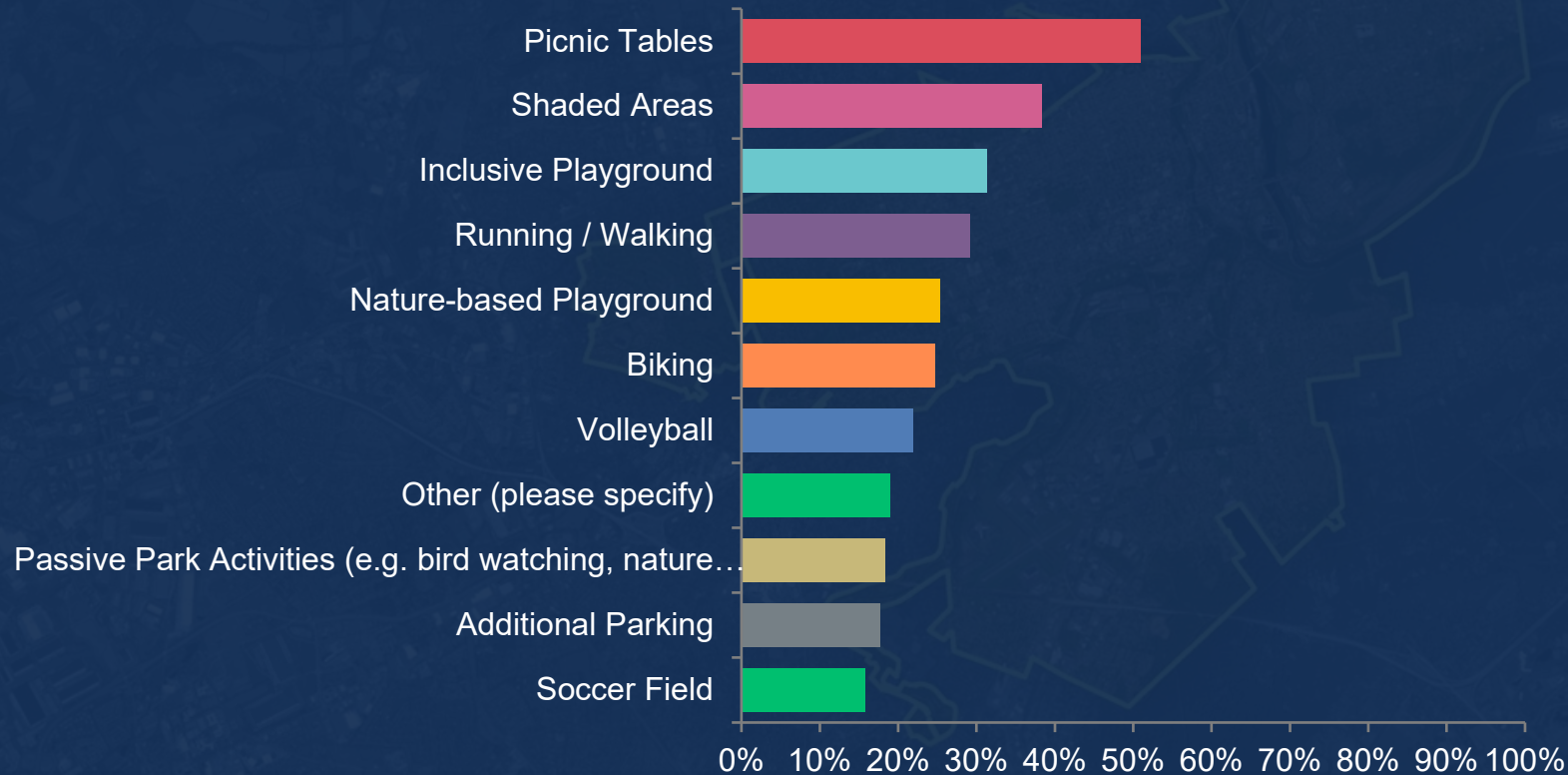

Features of our Allentown Parks system are tightly woven into the fabric of our City landscape and are inseparable from our many other civic “systems” including: our roads, sidewalks, transit, street trees; waterways, stormwater, and the City water and wastewater systems.

We know collaboration is possible to ensure that any improvements to these systems will conserve and improve Allentown Park resources.



Draft Vision Statement

Allentown residents see good works underway to make improvements needed to rehabilitate treasured parks and open spaces – and we share in a united commitment to help City leaders and staff to:

- *care for, keep clean, and conserve, maintain existing parks; and*
- *increase access to open space and facilities; and*
- *ensure that recreation resources and programs are universally-accessible.*

As residents we have and will continue to actively keep our parks clean and safe – and will:

- *plan, improve, and protect their ecologies; and*
- *support investments in recreation facilities and low cost/free programs; and*

Draft Goals: Infrastructure

Goal 1: **Safety** Allentown parks are modern and safe.

Opportunities for parks-related safety improvements desired by Allentown residents include:

- **Safe, accessible crosswalks / walkways / trails**
- **Traffic-calming measures** – adjacent to parks
- **Defensible spaces** – including: restrooms, lighting, security, and other features
- **Systematic inspection / maintenance** / repairs of facilities
- **Clearly-delineated safe waterway-access locations**
- **Clearly-stated park system rules** – with “context” explanations to encourage public participation
- **Police and park ranger presence** – regularly at park sites

Draft Goals: Infrastructure

Goal 2: **Public Access** Allentown parks are linked to our neighborhoods and to each other via safe pedestrian, bicycle, and transit routes.

Opportunities for public access improvements into and within park facilities, that are desired by Allentown residents include:

- **ADA-accessibility within parks**, including: parking, travel routes, restrooms, inclusive play, etc.
- **Coordinated LANTA services** to improve transit access to Allentown park sites
- **New / improved sidewalks, crosswalks** – install at entry “threshold” locations where pedestrian access into parks, or access between parks, is non-existent or where segments of travel routes are deteriorated
- **Bike route system (citywide)** – the Allentown bike system should acknowledge that parks are destinations, not only travel corridors

Draft Goals: Infrastructure

Goal 3: **Recreation Facilities** Strategic investments in park facilities help reduce maintenance costs and conserve natural resources.

Opportunities for park facilities Improvements that are desired by Allentown residents include:

- **New pools** / aquatic facilities, equitably located
- **New indoor recreation center**
- **Universal play environments** as typical features of City parks
- **Public restrooms** – open, clean, safe, accessible – in all Allentown parks, citywide
- **Regulation soccer pitch** / multi-purpose field
- **Access to natural waterways** for recreation
- **Additional basketball courts**
- **Formalized community gathering spaces**
- **Shade** through increased tree canopy and structures
- **Conduct outreach** with volunteer groups to help with park upkeep

Draft Goals: Infrastructure

Goal 4: **Ecology**

Ecology is fostering the associations of earth's natural systems, including people.

Opportunities for ecological improvements within City parks as desired by Allentown residents include:

- **Manage valley floodplains** to help moderate flooding
- **Protect water quality** with vegetative buffers that benefit habitat for aquatic life
- **Steward tree canopy** to reduce neighborhood heat effects and support multi-species habitats
- **Revegetate City parks / public rights of way** – as a major proactive protection of local air quality
- **Integrate stormwater management features** at all sites

Draft Goals: Infrastructure

Goal 5: **Open Space** Allentown's open space areas may be increased and made more effective.

Opportunities to increase open spaces and make existing public sites more accessible were identified by Allentown residents to include:

- **Reclaim previously under-utilized City-owned sites** for dedicated park uses
- **Recognize “recreation-desert” areas in underserved neighborhoods**
- **Pursue priority partnerships to add parks/open spaces** in underserved neighborhoods
- **Create, restore missing connections** from underserved neighborhoods to the nearest City park
- **Consider mobile and pop-up recreation options** – such as Play Streets, Park in a Truck, and Monday Funday

Draft Goals: Programs

Goal 6: **Recreation / Education Experiences**

The legacy of recreation, educational, and cultural programs will continue to thrive within the venues of the Allentown park system.

Opportunities to improve recreation / educational programming were identified by Allentown residents to include:

- **Repair, maintain, and improve existing infrastructure** to ensure that recreation programs may function at capacity for each park site
- **Simplify administrative procedures required for non-city partners** to conduct approved programs within City park sites
- **Engage with partners who can contribute to facilities improvements** that benefit both their programs and the City parks system in general
- **Ensure that recreational programs consider and meet the needs of the underrepresented**, including teens, senior residents and individuals with disabilities
- **Continue to develop programming that promotes community wellness** and addresses chronic conditions that affect public health

Draft Goals: Management

Goal 7: **Operations & Maintenance**

City administrations will continue to build partnerships that help deliver efficient maintenance, facility improvements, and preferred programming throughout the Allentown parks system.

Opportunities to improve operations and maintenance of the Allentown parks system were identified by Allentown residents to include:

- **The City and partners can increase the number of parks workers** committed to maintenance
- **Residents can be educated about their civic responsibilities** as Allentown Park users
- **Continue periodic user surveys**

Draft Goals: Management

Goal 8: **Governance**

In 2025, the City of Allentown welcomed The Allentown Parknership as a non-profit partner dedicated to assist in the funding of strategic municipal recreation and open space priorities.

Opportunities to improve governance of the City Parks system have been identified by Allentown residents and through “key” persons who were interviewed, including:

- **Collaborations between the City, the Parknership, and Trexler Trust will be negotiated** over time as the Parknership becomes established and becomes known as a supporter of Allentown parks
- *The consultant team is continuing to work with P&R staff to develop additional recommendations/opportunities*

Draft Goals: Management

Goal 9: **Finance**

The City of Allentown will commit annual municipal resources toward its recreation and open space improvements, maintenance, and programming.

Opportunities to improve financing partnerships dedicated to the Allentown parks system, include:

- **Match transportation funding sources with strategic funding for capital improvements at parks** – where those program goals coincide (eg: stormwater, trails, public right-of-way safety, etc.)
- **Dedicate municipal stormwater fees to leverage other funds for parks improvements** – where program goals coincide (eg: municipal stormwater BMPs inside City park sites, City ROW stormwater improvements at critical missing trail and bike route locations, etc.)
- **Target ecological priorities within the City park system to secure habitat restoration funding** from environmental program partners, such as the National Fish & Wildlife Foundation (NFWF) and the PA DEP Rivers Conservation Program
- **Require development partners who will benefit from adjacent City parks to contribute** annual financial support for maintenance of Allentown parks (included in the recent Draft Zoning Ordinance rewrite)
- **Coordinate the annual budget cycles between the City and annual funding from Trexler Trust**

Toolbox – Icons

SAFETY/ACCESS



crosswalks, gateways, multi-use trails (6-10' wide trails to and through parks), walkways (3-6' wide pedestrian trails)



Lighting to address safety and/or extend use into the night and/or winter



ADA accessible and universal elements



Signage that includes wayfinding to and through the park, public notice, kiosks for information, and educational



Traffic calming to reduce speeds around the parks for safety



LANTA services to provide access in areas where there are gaps

Toolbox – Icons

RECREATION/PROGRAMMING



Master planning to address all elements of the park – implement ones already completed (some are currently going through the master planning process)



New equipment to replace equipment that is old and/or damaged or add new elements



Repair existing park elements – some areas just need to be fixed like walkways, edges or newer equipment



Safe water access at streams and rivers for recreational use



Upgrade elements so that they can serve more people – full courts, upsize play areas, etc.



Additional programming that address all ages and abilities including educational programming

ENVIRONMENT / ECOLOGY



Riparian buffers to strengthen areas along waterways for water quality, improved ecology, safety, and stormwater management

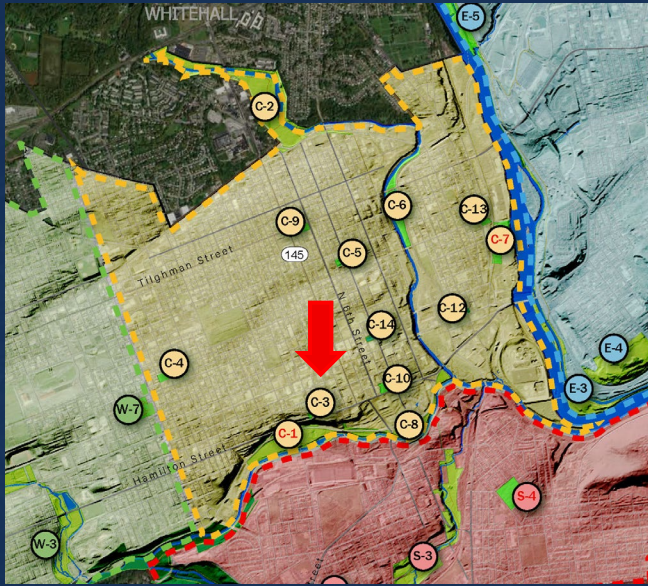


Habitat conservation for improved better ecological functions such as providing food for both us and animals, improved air and water quality, regulating climate and energy cycles



Stormwater management by using naturalized green storm water infrastructure (rain gardens, bioswales, check dams, etc.) and increasing tree canopy

Neighborhood park located in the Central Area C2: 1 pavilion, toddler playground, and walkway – improvements completed in 2015.

What: Allentown Monday Funday

Where: Parks throughout Allentown, including Stevens, Bucky Boyle, and Irving Parks

Who: Organized by Parks & Rec staff with community organizations providing additional programming

When: After several years of dormancy, Monday Funday was restarted in Summer 2023. In 2025, Monday Funday events are planned for three Mondays each month throughout the summer.

Why is it a success: Monday Funday is an after-school pop-up series that provides Allentown residents with opportunities to explore new parks and meet new neighbors. Each event includes activities with a focus on Wellness, Active Play, or Community Cookout. Participants connect over activities like painting, lawn games, science experiments, and musical performances.
